The Mawson's Huts Foundation is excited to again present the Australian Antarctic Festival in Hobart. The festival was initially developed to showcase Hobart as a preeminent gateway to the Antarctic, sub-Antarctic and the Southern Ocean. This impetus has not diminished over the past decades – it has strengthened.

The Antarctic and Southern Ocean sector not only provides research, training and support services to the Australian Antarctic program, it does so for similar programs conducted by other nations from around the world. Mawson's Huts Foundation

The Australian Antarctic Festival is presented by the Mawson's Huts Foundation to bring the fascinating world of Antarctic science and exploration to Australians who may never have the opportunity to visit the frozen continent. Most activities are **FREE** but your donations will be gratefully received and will help the Mawson's Huts Foundation preserve Australia's most remote heritage property – the original huts of the 1911-1914 Australasian Antarctic Expedition led by Sir Douglas Mawson at Cape Denison in East Antarctica.



The Mawson's Huts Foundation and the Australian Antarctic Festival pay respect to the traditional and original owners of this land, the muwinina people, to pay respect to those that have passed before us and to acknowledge today's Tasmanian Aboriginal people who are the custodians of this land.

ANTARCTIC EXPO

In the hub of our waterfront activities, Princes Wharf No 1 (PW1), the Antarctic Expo is open from 10am to 4pm on Saturday 24 and Sunday 25 August 2024. The Expo features examples of Antarctic-based transport and a display of historic radio communications similar to that used by early Australian Antarctic expeditioners.

There are also exhibits from many of the companies and agencies that work in Antarctica.

Look for displays and information about the ANARE Club, Aurora Expeditions, the National Archives of Australia, the Tasmanian Polar Network, the Swiss Embassy, the Australian Defence Force and, of course, the Mawson's Huts Foundation.

The Australian Antarctic Division and the CSIRO both have displays either within PW1 or on the forecourt in front of PW1, along with Helicopter Resources, William Adams Caterpillar and more.

The Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies (in the adjacent building Princes Wharf No 2) is also open to the public over this weekend from 10am to 2pm on both days.

TASMANIAN MUSEUM AND ART GALLERY

The Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery is hosting three displays during the festival. The redeveloped Islands to Ice exhibit will again be open and will serve as a continuous display for TMAG into the future. Through Our Eyes, an imaginative multi-media installation focusing on women and their personal and professional relationship with Antarctica, is in the Museum's Bond Store from Tuesday 6 August until Sunday 1 September, while the Beaker Street Science Photography Prize continues in the Museum's Link Foyer until Friday 23 August 2024.

PHILLIP LAW LECTURE

AUSTRALIA AND THE ANTARCTIC TREATY delivered by Emeritus Professor Marcus Haward





For over sixty years, Antarctica and the Southern Ocean have been governed and protected by the Antarctic Treaty System. Established in a time of heightened geopolitical tension and strong national interests, its key principles include the peaceful use of Antarctica, a ban on military activities, and a focus on scientific research.


Australia has historically played a crucial role in upholding and revitalising the Antarctic Treaty System, often balancing national interests with international cooperation. But during our era of renewed geopolitical tension and heightened national interests, can Australia and the Treaty System continue to adapt? Join Emeritus Professor Marcus Haward for the Phillip Law Lecture and discover why Antarctica and the Southern Ocean are still of close and immediate concern to Australia

Marcus Haward is an Emeritus Professor in the Oceans and Cryosphere Centre at the Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies, University of Tasmania, and a Program Leader in the Blue Economy Cooperative Research Centre.

Marcus is also a member of the Centre for Marine Socioecology, University of Tasmania and an Honorary Professor at the Centre for Policy Futures at the University of Queensland.

WIRELESS COMMUNICATIONS. AN ESSENTIAL PART OF MAWSON'S AUSTRALASIAN ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION 1911-14



Members of the Radio and Electronics Association of Southern Tasmania (REAST) will be at the Antarctic Expo on Saturday 24 and Sunday 25 August with displays of radio equipment similar to that used by Antarctic expeditioners over the decades.

There will also be a Morse Code station at which you can send and receive messages using the same

communications method as that used by Walter Hannam in 1912. Hannam communicated using the most modern technology of the day, Morse Code, and used a 1.5 kilowatt 'spark' transmitter.

HISTORY

Walter Henry Hannam was registered as the 'wireless operator and mechanic' on Douglas Mawson's Australasian Antarctic Expedition (1911-14). But records show he was much more than that, having found fame amongst the other expeditioners as a 'chef par excellence' and reported to be among the first to kick a football on the Antarctic continent.

Hannam helped to set up the wireless stations on Macquarie Island en route to Antarctica and then established the first radio to operate on the Antarctic continent in the winter of 1912. The first message to be received from Antarctica and acknowledged by the station on the Queen's Domain in Hobart, via the Hannam-installed station on Macquarie Island, was on 25 September 1912.



The exhibition 'Through Our Eyes' brings the southernmost continent, commonly understood as far away and isolated, closer to a large audience. This imaginative multi-media installation focuses on women and their personal and professional relationship with Antarctica in a way that simply says, 'A Woman's Place is in Antarctica'.

PENGUIN ROOKERIES

The Penguin Rookeries display has grown to be a firm family favourite over the past few Australian Antarctic Festivals, and this year it will be bigger, more colourful and internationally more interesting than ever. Over 10,000 Adélie penguin cut-outs are expected from schools right around Australia as well as some from overseas. Penguins were sent to children in all other Antarctic gateway cities. See if you can find the ones returned from Punta Arenas, Ushuaia, Cape Town and Christchurch.

Another colony of penguins was sent to the Robert Fitzroy Academy in Croydon, UK. Robert Fitzroy (1805-1865), after whom the Academy is named, has a connection with Hobart. He was a British naval officer, hydrographer, and meteorologist who commanded HMS Beagle on its voyage around the world with Charles Darwin aboard as naturalist. During this voyage, HMS Beagle visited Hobart for 12 days from 5 February 1836.

Where do our 50cm mdf penguin cut-outs come from?

Our Penguin Rookery would not be so successful without the help of our friends at the Tasmanian Men's Sheds Association. Men's Sheds right around Tasmania pitched in and produced our 10,000 penguins, some using state-of-the-art laser cutters and others reverting to the good old jigsaw method. Regardless of how they were manufactured, each penguin is perfect and each is now sporting colourful coats lovingly applied by 10,000 school children.

Once the scan data was collected in Antarctica it took more than 4000 hours of development to create this unique VR experience. This large-scale project brings Antarctica to people in a way never seen before.

Hillary's Hut was initially used as a base for the party of 23 men engaged in exploration and important scientific research as part of the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition (TAE) and the New Zealand party of the International Geophysical Year (IGY).



The hut was occupied by the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition (1955–58) and the International Geophysical Year (1957–58), which established Scott Base in Antarctica.

You will virtually explore the five spaces that the men worked in, including the cold porch, 'mess' room, radio room, kitchen, and Sir Ed's room. Supported by City of Hobart and Antarctic Tasmania.

The journey doesn't stop there. Outside, join the Mobile Antarctic Classroom (MAC) for interactive demonstrations that bring the science of Antarctica to life!
